### FACES OF THREDBO 2022 Kim Clifford



Kim Clifford as a young man

Kim was born in 1956. His mother, Beryl was the driving force to move him at three and a half to an unknown ski resort called Thredbo where the family built the commercial lodge Winterhaus in 1959. Beryl began skiing as a 5 year old at Hotel Kosciusko in the 1930s.

Kim and his siblings grew up on the Thredbo ski slopes and they were regular competitors in the children's ski races and were members of the new Thredbo Ski Racing Club.

On leaving school in 1975, Kim began employment with Kosciusko Thredbo as a training area director under the mentorship of Albert van der Lee. He was fortunate to spend 3 to 6 months in different areas of the resort. In time he became a supervisor and then a manager.

Kim said "KT and Lend Lease were great employers and we both saw the benefits for both sides. It was beneficial to them because I travelled overseas when I was ski racing and I used to bring back ideas and suggestions."

Kim skied the World Cup circuit for seven or eight years, representing Australia in Slalom, Giant Slalom and Downhill at the 1976 Winter Olympics in Innsbruck and at was selected for 1980 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid, USA, however broke his wrist in the week prior to competing.

Upon retiring from racing, Kim attended the Colorado Mountain College, USA with an Associate Degree in Applied Science / Business Management with an emphasis on resort management. He returned to Thredbo for the ski season and working in a management capacity during the American summer breaks.


In 1985, Kim went to work for K G Murray Publishing, operators of Perisher and Smiggins, however he was invited to return as the Resort Operations Director in 1990. He was appointed General Manager of Kosciusko Thredbo in 1996 and he retired from this position in 2012.

Together with his wife Judith, they have now lived in ski resorts for 43 odd years and this season (2022) is his 62nd, mainly in Thredbo. Their children Olivia and Will, have grown up in the ski industry and now their grandchildren have become very willing snow sports participants.





### FACES OF THREDBO 2022 William Robert (Bob) Arnott 1922 - 2016

Bob was introduced to skiing at the Hotel Kosciusko in 1935 during a school excursion and a love of the sport was generated instantly. That love led to him developing a career in racing which later evolved to incorporate major contributions to ski administration and ski history.

As a young man Arnott immersed himself in the skiing lifestyle. He became the Ski Club of Australia's top competitive skier, and raced in NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, Europe and New Zealand. He was a member of Australia's first alpine squad together with Billy Day and Barry Patton at the 1952 Oslo Winter Olympics.

Arnott originally favoured the development of the Twin Valleys north of Thredbo where he became the Australian slalom champion in 1953 after having felled trees to lengthen the run, he switched his loyalty to the development of Thredbo resort where he visited frequently continually working on his ski technique until his very senior years when he could no longer drive.

When Thredbo began to take shape, Arnott was instrumental in the recruitment of leading Austrian ski instructors Leonhard Erharter and Helmut Pfister who helped put the new resort on the map while teaching many Australians the technical skills of skiing.

As an administrator Arnott became a national selector, an Olympic official, a delegate to the Australian Ski Federation and a participant on the Federation Internationalé de Ski. Together with Bob Beattie who at the time the US coach and a member of the FIS, they authored the modern international rating system for ski racers known as the "two Bob rule".

Bob recorded the life and times of the Ski Club of Australia in his book Seventy-Five Seasons (1998).

Later in his life Bob Arnott was an ambassador for the Thredbo Historical Society's Ski Museum Foundation and he became one of the society's first life members. His involvement in skiing was broad, deep and grounded in the love he felt for Thredbo.

When Bob died early in 2016, he was survived by his wife Simone and their children Adrienne and Axel.

# AN OBJECT IN THE COLLECTION: The Nutcracker

The Nutcraker

A nutcracker is a device shaped like a household nutcracker and attached by a cord to a swami leather belt around the skier's waist for use on a rope tow.

The nutcracker opens up and the moving rope is clamped in the round bowl in the middle of the nutcracker after which the nutcracker fastens and the skier is dragged up the hill.

On reaching the top the skier must quickly open the nutcracker before the rope goes around the bull wheel at the top of the lift.

When there was a fairly long rope tow, supports on posts with pullleys on top were required to carry the rope to keep it off the ground and the skier couldn't keep holding when going over the pulleys.



#### The Nutcraker

The nutcracker was designed so that instead of the skiers holding on to a rope tow with their hands, they held on to the nutcracker as it bounded over the pulleys. and saved their knuckles. Skiers needed to be careful not to let their fingers run over the pulleys on the rope tow which was waist high.

The advantage of the nutcracker was that you could get on or off anywhere along the rope. in 1959.

The first ski lift in Thredbo (1957) was a long rope tow going half-way up Crackenback mountain and nutcrackers were essential for using the tow.

# The Museum has benefited greatly from government grants. The Federal

Government funded Australian Museums & Galleries Association (AMaGA) Chart Program grant for \$3,000, facilitated the purchase of a new computer. It has an expanded memory capacity which will enable opportunities to share Thredbo's past and present with the "digital" generation.

The installation of a security camera purchased though a Small Museums Grant of \$1,500 and funded by the NSW Museums & Galleries, ensures the safety of the Museum's collection and equipment.

### George Petersen's Kosciusko



Articles from SNOW REVELRY the journal of the Kosciusko Snow Reveller's Club



2nd Edition

Published by Perisher Historical Society, the 2nd edition of George Petersen's Kosciusko is available from TAM. It has a soft cover,164 pages, 21x30 cm, rare b&w images, and costs \$50 plus postage & packing \$13.40. The book has been reproduced by Jan Glover who has added 12 pages of photographs taken by George Petersen.

It is a compilation of articles from "Snow Revelry", the journal of the Kosciusko Snow Reveller's Club August 1953 to 1958. George's connection with Kosciusko began in 1920 and he was the manager of Hotel Kosciusko from 1938 to 1951 when the hotel was engulfed in flames.

One of the articles refers to the place name of Crackenback which was derived from the bullock driver bringing timber to the sawmill and cracking a stock whip on the backs of the bullocks pulling the logs over the mountainous terrain.
